Meet Bob LeDoux



Bob LeDoux has been a fixture in the ballooning community here in Oregon for decades. He didn't grow up here however. He was born in Bakersfield, California in 1947. His father manufactured farm produce machinery during World War II. His mother was a nurse at a local German prisoner of war camp when she met his dad. After the war his father moved his family and his shop to Sunnyside, Washington, and later to Mt. Angel, Oregon.

Bob graduated from Oregon State University in 1969 with a degree in statistics. He then went into the Peace Corps from 1969 to 1971. He was stationed in Jamaica.

As a graduate student at Penn State in 1971-1973, Bob joined the Nittany Soaring Club and learned to fly. Upon returning to Oregon, he helped set up the Salem Glider Club which operated out of the Independence Airport. He purchased a sailplane and built a wooden one.

Bob worked for the State of

Oregon as a budget analyst. He was on a team which prepared billiondollar budgets for the Governor.

Bob met his wife Marianne in 1978. She was operating a Jaycee food booth at the Lebanon airport during an Experimental Aircraft Association meeting. Bob bought the last hot dog she had to sell. She sat beside him on the trailer tongue while he ate the hot dog. "I proceeded to show her the aircraft. We left the event with no further plans. I came back the next day, and she had stood up her date in the hopes I would return."

They got married in 1980. He spent his weekends flying his glider. "Mari became concerned my weekends away were leaving "household" duties undone. So I agreed to think about other aviation endeavors. One morning we saw Spencer Etzel inflating a balloon at Antique Powerland in Brooks. We stopped to ask questions. Moving to balloons from gliders seemed reasonable."

"I decided to trade the glider for a balloon — an idea Mari thought was crazy." Following a lead from an ad in Trade-A-Plane they met Lance Sundown, a salvage operator in Oakland, California. The negotiations for a trade began.

"We towed the sailplane to Oakland, went into a bar parking lot, and dialed a telephone number from the nearby pay phone. Soon two doors opened up in an adjacent, razor wire topped concrete compound, and out comes a short tubby guy with an eye patch. He was followed by a bunch of bronze tanned young men wearing speedos. Mari noticed the speedos."

"A tour of the training facility, with its water tower and old cast iron cannon was followed by a walk

down to his yacht on the waterfront, about a mile South of the old Oakland Bay bridge. We finished title transfers, hooked up the balloon trailer and drove out the front gates. The doors closed behind us as Mari and I stopped to think about what had happened."

They had just become the owners of a Raven Rally RX-7 named Sundance. Bob took flight lessons from Brick Morgan. Mari had no flying interests but crewed on instructional flights in Woodburn.

"In 1982 I completed my
Commercial certificate and still
remember the fateful day that
followed: Mari was my passenger
when I uttered the long since
regretted question, "Would you
like to take the burner?" She went
straight to a Commercial certificate,
no Private. We were then tasked
with sharing the balloon. We would
each take our turn. But my log
shows seven hours as PIC during
one season.

"In my defense I decided to build a single place balloon. Castaway was a blue colored envelope over our home-built

basket."

From 1992 to 1996 Bob published the Balloon Builder's Journal. It is still available at http://www.apexballoons.com/balloon-builders-journal/

Bob started the journal because he found little information for a builder. "The Journal was a sounding board to allow me to share my knowledge and generate contributions from others. The four years were intense, allowing little time for other endeavors. I stopped publishing when I felt it qualified as a basic textbook for the budding builder."

Over the years, Bob and Marianne have built seven balloons. Counting the years Bob was flying gliders, he has been a pilot for 50 years!

Bob's favorite rallies have been the Albany Art and Air Festival (and all the previous names that rally has had), and the Walla Walla Balloon Stampede. They flew the Stampede from 1984 through 2019. They had the same sponsor every year. They eventually transitioned from mere sponsor to honorary family members.

In both events, it has been the people who have made the rally memorable. In fact, his favorite aspect of our sport is the people they meet.

Bob has had a long and storied tenure in ballooning. We are a richer sport due to his involvement.

During 2020 they flew SewLight II often.




Fly Inside? Why Not?

While searching for photos of the balloons Bob and Marianne LeDoux have built I ran into a photo taken in 1995 at the Tillamook blimp hanger. At that time the hanger was home to an airplane museum. Rod Purdum came up with the idea of flying balloons inside the hanger. He obtained permission and a memorable event was created. The official name was Tillamook Air Museum Balloon Fest. It was popularly known as the Fly Inside.

It was held in January, which is traditionally cold, wet and yucky in Western Oregon, especially on the Oregon coast. It was marvelous to be flying inside a nice, warm, dry hanger while the rain was pounding down just feet away. More than a dozen balloons were there. The rally was held for two consecutive years.





Rod's favorite story from the event occurred the first year at the very end of the day. Almost everyone had departed with the exception of one local balloonist. His balloon was on the hanger floor. still tied off with tether lines, when his passenger got out of the basket without permission. The balloon, of course, shot straight up. The pilot immediately started to vent. Luckily, it was in the middle of the structure, so it had further to travel before it hit the rafters. Hit them it did. It turned into a mushroom shape before it started to descend. There were ripples from the impact along the length of the envelope. Amazingly, there was no damage to the envelope.

My favorite story revolved around Ted Wirch who flew an Adams balloon. Ted was always bragging about how fast his envelope would deflate when he activated the pop-top. In true Ted fashion, he shouted out, "Hey, watch this!" Then he opened the top vent completely. A fast, hot gush of air broke free and zoomed up to the rafters. Those rafters were the home to more than one owl over the years. The gust of air dislodged a great many feathers, owl pellets, as well as lots of dust. Gifford Hawn was

sitting on an envelope right beside Ted's balloon. He had just started to drink an open cup of Pepsi when all the debris from the rafters suddenly splashed into his cup. He quickly decided he wasn't so thirsty after all.

Looking at these photos brought back lots of fun memories. I'm glad we were able to be part of this unforgettable event.
