Directions to the April WAS meeting in Newberg at 2902 E. 2nd St.

From the south, take I-5 to exit 278 Aurora/Donald. Turn left on Ehlen Rd. and go under the freeway overpass. Take Ehlen Rd NE and McKay Rd NE to OR-219 N 10 min (6.9 mi). Turn right onto OR-219 N. 5 min (3.8 mi). Turn right on E 2nd St. Go one block to Nut Tree Ranch Mobile Estates driveway and turn right. The recreation center building is straight ahead. Park in front or on either side.

From the west, use OR 18 or OR 99-W to Dundee and follow OR 18 (Newberg bypass—don't continue to Newberg) to OR 219. Turn left on OR 219 and Turn right on E 2nd St. Go one block to Nut Tree Ranch Mobile Estates driveway and turn right. The recreation center building is straight ahead. Park in front or on either side.



From the north or east, either follow I-5 to Exit 278 and use the instructions above, or use the following instructions.

Use OR 99-W through Tigard and Sherwood. Enter Newberg and turn left on Springbrook Rd. In one mile, turn right on E. 2nd St. Go 1/2

block and turn left into the Nut Tree Ranch Mobile Estates at 2902. The recreation center building is straight ahead. Park in front or on either side.

Planning to Fly at Wooden Shoe Tulip Farm?

Here's what you need to know:

There will be tulips blooming in the fields. It's our privilege to put balloons in the sky above those flowers.


The Iverson family has once again generously offered their farm as a launch site during the Wooden Shoe Tulip Festival. The opening date was Friday, March 24, 2023. The farm is located at 33814 S. Meridian Road, Woodburn, Oregon. (They are 15 minutes east of I-5.)

Pilots and crew will not be charged admission. Paid riders, however, do need to buy an admission ticket on line at: https://www.woodenshoe.com/events/tulipfest/ticket-information/.

No waiver is needed this year, unless you are taking up paid riders. If you do have paying passengers then everyone needs to sign a waiver and the balloon owner needs to add the Wooden Shoe Tulip Farm as an additional insured on his/her insurance policy.

Balloons and their chase vehicles will be allowed back on the farm property after the flight.

Be forewarned, there is a big red zone nearby. The Rose family owns a huge chunk of land east of the tulip fields. They are not at all balloon friendly. They do not want anyone landing on their property. You can find a copy of the Red Zone map for the area surrounding the tulip

As always, carry one map in the basket and have one in the chase vehicle. We all want to keep landowner relations as good as they

can be in this area.

The Iverson family has been gracious in allowing balloons to launch from their fields for years and years. It's important for all of us to follow these requests.

In-Person Safety Seminar Was a Huge Success

The Pacific Northwest Safety Seminar is now in the books. Fortythree people crammed into the Greater Jefferson Community Center on Saturday, March 11, 2023. The seminar received very high marks from the attendees.

John Saltenberger, our local micro-meteorologist once again received a ton of accolades. We are so fortunate to have him present at our seminars and club meetings over the years. He loves to share his passion for weather forecasting with others, and he especially likes to talk to balloonists since we start with a higher level of understanding than the average college student.

Larry Simburger did a great job of discussing accidents, pilot restraint systems, and accident analysis His use of multi-media got more than one positive comment.

Laura Hancock's innovative approach to discussing distraction during flight was not only entertaining, but really drove her point home.

Mark Yonker gave an excellent presentation on the possible pit falls

in buying a used balloon system. Andrea McEvoy and Jessica Geib both added their personal stories to the presentation. Buying used is fine, but you can get in a "Sticky Wicket" even when you think you've thought of everything that can go wrong. Mark's advice is to have the system inspected by someone you trust.

Brent Black played the part of an obnoxious blogger hot on the trail of a sensational story of a balloon hung up on a tall light standard. He played his part to perfection. His counter point was Jerry Bales in his Yamhill County Sherriff's Department uniform (complete with a donut donated by Larry Simburger). Then there were the crew and spectators played by members of the audience. They were very creative and spontaneous. When an actual fire truck inadvertently drove by just as Brent was demanding to know when the fire department would arrive. It added an exclamation point to the presentation. Brent proclaimed, "That's it! I quit! I can't top that!" Those were the last "official" words spoken at the seminar. How perfect.

Ernie Hartt

February 6th, 1963 - March 24th, 2023



"I'm not dead." - Monty Python & the Holy Grail

To learn of Ernie Hartt's passing comes with a deep and heavy sadness, weighing us down as we share this news. Ernie passed on to Stovokor on March 24, 2023 at 60 years young. Ernie loved hot air balloons, Great Danes, and, most of all, Jenny. Ernie, dear friend, you're not dead in our hearts and minds. You have touched us all and made our lives better, richer, and more joyful in ways that will allow you to live forever in the memories of those whose lives you have impacted.

As a child Ernie was a paperboy - he knew the names of all the neighborhood dogs and kids. He was always sure to put the papers in between the doors to keep them dry. He played games not sports and was always a jokester. He first found his love of art in his youth, inspired by his family of artists. He also learned to embody his father's loyalty.

At the start of his junior year of high school, Ernie moved to El Paso, TX where he graduated in the top ten percentile of his class. He earned a full scholarship to Texas A&M where he graduated in 1985 with a B.A. in biology and a minor in art history. He actively participated

in his college sci-fi club, Cepheid Variable, throughout college and served as art director and assistant vice chair of programming for AggieCon. Yes, he wore cowboy boots in Texas.

After graduation, Ernie moved back home to El Paso where he discovered his passion for hot air ballooning. He first joined Fred Spite's crew in 1987, after his sister, Maria, introduced Ernie to ballooning. Immediately hooked, they became regular crew for anyone and everyone that needed a helping hand - the 'Generic Chase Crew'. In January of 1988, Ernie and Maria moved to San Diego, where he started graduate school and they both crewed professionally for Pacific Horizons. This is also when Ernie met fellow grad student and love of his life, Jenny. They both completed their Masters of Science in Biology from San Diego State University in 1991.

During the 1990s, Ernie worked for the endangered species program at the San Diego Zoo and the Wild Animal Park, with the Condor breeding program, and later the Shrike breeding program, all of which led to published papers. The Shrike project saw him spend many hours of observation on San Clemente Island where the local wildlife was able to see him in his natural state.

Inspired by the great couples of literature and lore - Beren and Luthien, Heathcliff and Catherine, Calvin and Hobbes - Ernie married Jenny, the love of his life, on the beach in Del Mar in 1997, nine years after they first met. They were side by side from then on.

Ernie and Jenny bought their first hot air balloon, Spinner, in 1991 and both received their pilot's certificates in 1992. When Ernie

and Jenny married they received a generous check from high school friends as a wedding gift with the memo line jokingly reading "for sex toys". They immediately bought a hot air balloon and rightfully named it Sex Toy - Ernie loved to listen to announcers at balloon rallies pause to make sure they had read that name right. Along with Spinner, Skidbladnir, Sex Toy and the cloudhoppers The Bomber, and Twist & Shout, Ernie and Jenny took to the skies all over the country. In addition to being an accomplished pilot, Ernie was crew chief extraordinaire, not only for Jenny but for Elevated Ballooning and the Teton Valley Balloon Rally. Ernie brought his love of ballooning and education together at the BFA's High Sierra Balloon Camp and as a board of director for the Teton Valley Balloon Rally, where he supported the growth of a scholarship program designed to give kids the opportunity to learn how to fly. In 2017 he founded the Easter Hop rally of cloudhoppers in Temecula.

Ernie spent his life in support of others. He was always Jenny's biggest fan and shared her love of her work - Have Dane Will Travel, WolfHartt Images, and Chicks Talking Pics. While he wasn't a fan of small children, Ernie's passion for expanding minds (not through LSD but through education) brought him to teaching at The Winston School in Del Mar, CA for twenty-five years. Ernie went above and beyond for the school and his students in so many ways – from taking the unique time needed by each individual student to help them understand something that stumped them to becoming the IT director and even the Dungeons & Dragons Master for after school gamers. His legacy resides in the life paths of his students, some of whom have kept in touch with him over the decades since they graduated from high school.

Never one to sit still, years of playing Tetris enabled Ernie, together with Jenny, to pack a truck and camper with two hot air balloons, a tandem kayak, Great Danes, bloody Mary mix and some scotch and hit the road to travel the west for summer adventures.

Ernie embodied just how cool it can be to be a true nerd. His personal style consisted of wellworn t-shirts immortalizing 30+ years of balloon festivals, shorts, mismatched Converse sneakers (which sometimes resulted in him grabbing two left shoes instead of a pair), and always the pink cap so Jenny could find him in a crowd. Have you seen him wear pants (the wildlife on San Clemente Island never did)? If so, you're one of the lucky few. He could quote Monty Python in the same breath used to remind us of the nature of molecular structure. He loved kumquats and adventures, and his collection of fantasy art is nuanced and elaborate. He could dance a mean jig and was known for his moves at Renaissance Faires. His vinyl collection shows a love for rock'n'roll that appreciated the unknowns as well as the greats. Ernie's quiet steadiness and solid presence could fill a room, and he

had the ability to build a community wherever he went.

Eater of roadside plants, teacher to all those around him, lover of cooking and all good food, Ernie was a stocky and solid presence with a nimble and ninja-like mind. He could always be counted on to fall asleep anywhere. He was often the voice of reason and the source of a smile in the same moment. May we all be inspired to walk the world with the kindness and passion Ernie carried for others and our planet, never taking for granted the opportunities we have to do what we love with those we love.

Ernie is survived by his one true love Jenny Wolf, his father Ernie (Rita), sisters Linda (Shawn) and Maria (Roger), nieces and nephew, Alyssa, Bayley, Emily and Stuart (-Lyndsey), sister-in-law Wendy and Dane Martok. He joins his mother Christel and Danes Selar, Varel, and K'Ehleyr in Stovokor.

A celebration of Ernie's incredible life will take place on Saturday, April 1, 2023 at 11:07am with a gentle yoga practice at the Nude Beach in Del Mar, as this was one of Ernie's favorite ways to relax and restore. If nude yoga isn't your jam, please join us at The Winston School at 3:00pm that afternoon where we will be able to share memories and give comfort



to Jenny and each other. Lunch in the courtyard will follow the celebration.
