## Their Legacy is Enduring Friendship

The end of this flying season was the end of the road for several pilots/ balloon owners in our area. Pilots Carmen Blakely, Cheryl Isaacs and Laura Hancock all stepped back this fall. Gerald Bales, co-owner of Morning Glory along with Laura, also stepped back. Bales and Laura decided to give their balloon to Brittney Biddescombet from Walla Walla, Washington. Justin Anderson, also from Walla Walla, is now the proud owner of Cheryl's balloon. Carmenis working on passing hers on to one of her long-time crew members, Nick Gunther.

While everyone here will be missed in the Pacific Northwest skies, they brought so much more to our ballooning community. Back in the early 2000's when they got their commercial pilot certificates they decided to fly in every western state. That meant they put a lot of miles on their vehicles considering some rallies are more than a two-day drive away.

They caravanned together to many of the rallies. They'd pick a rendezvous point, like Biggs Junction, and go the rest of the way together. Which was very helpful if anyone had chase vehicle challenges. More importantly, they usually stayed in the same hotel, or in recent years they rented big houses and set up communal meals. Each pilot and their crew would cook for everyone else for one meal during the weekend. One year there were more than 30 people crammed into the dining, living room, kitchen area of the house they had rented in Winthrop, Washington.

There were always puzzles, usually of balloons, to be assembled over the weekend. There were card and dice games to be played. As Carmen said, "It helped to solidify our friendships. We were one large family by this point."

They traveled to the Alvord Desert in Eastern Oregon to fly eight to ten times. It's probably safe to say they were the only balloonists to ever fly in that desolate area. But they didn't stop there. One year, after not being able to fly in March in Winthrop they went back over Labor Day weekend. Fun was the center piece of each of these excursions.

During regular rally weekends they would often add adventures such as wine tasting, sleigh rides, float trips, and rock hunting. Both Carmen and Laura have extensive rock collections in their yards. Many of those rocks "mysteriously" appeared in their chase trucks while on a ballooning trip. Those rocks now serve as permanent reminders of the wonderful times they've spent with their ballooning family.

While ballooning is a naturally gregarious sport, Carmen, Cheryl, Laura and Bales built up the friendships to the point, those of us who are left will not let them disappear completely. We will be encouraging them to join us in weekend adventures in the years to come. They are part of the balloon family they helped create, plus they add a huge fun factor to any gathering.

## **Chasing the Winds**

I took my first flight as a passenger in Napa Valley at early dawn when the fog was still drifting down the hills to the grapevines down below. My friend and I met the pilot where he had his balloon all laid out and the 2-crew people were preparing everything for our adventure. As the pilot turned on the burner and heated the balloon, I stood in awe at how easy it looked and yet scary to some degree. Once the balloon lifted up and leveled in its place, we climbed in. The lift off I can still remember, was the softest and most exciting thing I had ever done in my life. Going up so smoothly and seeing the light fog below on the rolling vineyards. We headed straight for the vineyard and the pilot told us he was going to set down between the vines for a close up to the grapes. I was doubtful that would be possible but he proved me wrong and set the basket as gentle as possible right between the staked vines. We sat for only a moment or two and lifted off for our full flight. This was truly the most adventurous thing I had done so far in my life and was thrilled to be there.

My next balloon adventure was with Vista Balloons, Roger and Catherine, at the Tigard Balloon Festival in 1996. That again was so magnificent I was hooked. Michael

and I both signed up to be crew and began traveling to Albuquerque with them and crewing in Newberg. It was the best time ever for the two of us.

During one of the Albuquerque trips Carmen and I went for a flight and decided this was something we could do and wanted to do. When we got home, we decided to get lessons and buy a balloon and added another person to our group, Brian Forness.

That was when our two most favorite people Bob and Mary Ann LeDoux offered to help us get trained and even helped find our first balloon, Outer Limits. They became our instructors and got us through the book study and our test on line. Then we got many flight training hours in their balloons and Outer Limits. It was the best part of my life, besides being married.

Licensed and ready to go on our own, we shared Outer Limits between the three of us. It was hard at first to get time between all of us by doing short hops and trading out but we made it through.

In 2003 Carmen and I decided we needed another balloon so we could both fly at the same time so we had Tierra Madre built thru Ultra Magic. Michael came up with the design and colors so we ordered it.

In time we grew out of Outer Limits so we sold that and I got another balloon from a longtime friend and pilot Denny Wright. This allowed the opportunity to carry passengers and fly at the same rallies with both of us in the air at the same time.

We wanted to do some rallies so we started looking around and found several so we applied for them. We went to California, Idaho, Utah, Arizona, Wyoming, Washington, Colorado, New Mexico and of course Oregon. We were very lucky



to have many balloon friends who came as crew for us and we loved having them with us. They knew what to do and had things ready by the time we came back from pilot briefing. This is how I got so involved and along with all the friends and people we have made and met along the way it has been a dream come true that I never knew I would ever have.

My years around and in balloons has been the most fun, whether I fly or not and has given me a chance to make lots of friends. Ballooning is a community and we look out for each other and help when and how we can. It has allowed me to make some of the strongest friendships I have ever had and I truly cherish that.

I will miss that as a pilot but I hope to stay involved at least as a crew person for some years to come. Watching and helping new pilots come up the ranks is what it is all about. Keeping the sport alive and well, my hope is that I have helped with that even just a bit. I am retiring from flying but not the sport.

## Flying in Cappadocia, Turkey

Editor's Note: We first met Mack and Susan Gardner back in the 1990's when the Collage of Culture balloon rally was held in Madras, Oregon. Mack was in charge of the Junior ROTC program at the high school. The kids came out to crew for all the balloons the weekend the rally was held. Tim was lucky enough to get the Jr. ROTC as our sponsor, so we got to spend extra time with the Gardners. We formed a friendship that has lasted through the years. Once when the Oregon Contingent was driving over to Madras to fly (after the rally

had died), Mack and Susan offered us the use of their home even though they were going to be out of town. We took full advantage of their generosity, and held communal meals at the house.

Fast forward to a few weeks ago: It was 4:00 am and I heard my phone go ding, ding, ding, ding with even more dings. It was Mack enthusiastically sending me photos from their balloon adventure in Turkey. Once I was up, I shamelessly begged him for a story about the experience for this newsletter. He, of course, obliged, and even received permission for me to use photos taken by another member of his group.

In ballooning, we meet the most positive people, who become lifelong friends. That is the best part of this sport!

In early October, my wife Susan and I along with a few other friends, launched with Voyager Balloons for a one-hour flight over Cappadocia, Turkey. Susan and I were the only ones who had ever flown in a hot air balloon before. Three of us were former career pilots. I was an Army aviator, fixed and rotary wing, another friend was a USAF long haul heavy lift pilot, and the third was a civilian long haul heavy lift cargo pilot. All three of us were, in our own way, a little unsure of this upcoming experience. Let me put you to rest — we all had a wonderful, professional and safe flight. The pilot, ground and chase crew were all excellent. There were a total of 15 passengers in the basket. Shortly after loading, the pilot, a Turkish man, gave his safety briefing in English which included hard or moving landing procedures. He, also, made us demonstrate we had the physical ability to follow through on his instructions. The full balloon was well maintained and looked to be in excellent condition. Before the pilot performed any maneuvers, he informed us of his intentions. And several times during

the flight he inquired about how we were doing. From skimming along near the earth, low altitude to 3000 feet and explaining the geography and history of the area, during sunrise. The flight was very pleasant. As we were approaching landing, there was a slight breeze and in an abundance of caution, the pilot told us all to "assume the position." As soon as we touched down, two of his ground crew were on the basket to bring it to an immediate stop.

While my wife and I are very comfortable with all this, not all first timers are. So the pilot and his crew were all very cautious and considerate of the full passenger load. That morning there were at least 100 other hot air balloon launches. That is pretty standard for this place.


My take away is that this was a full up well done and very professional, safe operation and event. Voyager Balloons had several other balloons participating. There were multiple balloon companies and operators. With your own due diligence and research, you too can have a wonderful balloon experience over Cappadocia just as we did.

Turkey, in the view of some, may look like a back water place. Yes, in some places, it is, but the Cappadocia balloon experience has been ongoing for many years and is a major regional and Turkish national tourist marketing effort. Look up Cappadocia and you will also see an emphasis on seeing it from a hot air balloon. I was there nine years ago and it was a big deal then.

Prior to the balloon flight an opportunity presented itself to paraglide. Very different from flying an airplane or riding in a balloon. I decided to give it a try. I encountered no problems and had a wonderful experience. Flying in tandem with a Turkish instructor, a strong English speaker, I took off a mountain slope at 6,000 feet. It was all very professional and safely done, just like our ballooning experience.

I would recommend either of these adventures to anyone visiting Turkey.







