August Brought the Northwest Art & Air Festival to Albany by Shari Gale

The Albany balloon rally has had many names over the decades: Albany Balloon Fling, The Albany Great Balloon Escape and Wine Fest, and then just the Great Balloon Escape. Now it is the Northwest Art and Air Festival. If you add up all these versions of the rally, it is the longest running rally in Oregon. It is also the largest.

One thing Albany has at the end of August is an abundance of landing sites. There are literally hundreds of acres of harvested grass seed fields just waiting for balloons to come in for a landing.

Thursday, on media day, the balloons all headed south as usual. It was an easy choice to fly that morning. Friday, we faced another easy decision. No flights at all. Thunderstorms had rolled in that night. We were awakened by lightning strikes way too close to our house. We could see the flash even with our eyes closed and the big boom followed almost immediately. Then the hard rain came drumming down on our deck. We were very surprised to find the launch field dry that morning. It seems the rain

was very localized. Chris Whitfield, after checking the weather, closed the field. I overheard one spectator questioning that decision since the thunder clouds had moved just north of us. They might have been moving away, but they were still way too close for safe flying.

Luckily, the weather on Saturday and Sunday was much more friendly. We did head north, which is an unusual direction. Saturday Tim landed, along with at least six other balloons, in a big harvested field at the corner of Highway 99E and Scravel Hill Road. We had easy access and good company in that field. Sunday Tim landed in another huge field on southeast side of the small town of Jefferson. Once again, we had a lot of company in that field. In fact, some of the pilots were the same ones we'd landed beside the day before. However, there were several loud and continual protests to our presence on that spot of land. A big flock of geese had claimed that area as their own, and they were not at all happy to have been disturbed. They circled and circled above us, calling out to us — or cussing us

The Albany Parks and Recreation Department did a fantastic job of hosting this event along with Chris and his team. Everything ran smoothly. We were treated to some really good food, and even better camaraderie. What more could we possibly want?

The Spirit of Boise is Joyous

We always look forward to the Spirit of Boise Balloon Classic. It is now named the Scott Spencer Spirit of Boise Balloon Classic as a tribute to the rally's founder.

We did not travel to Boise in time for Kid's Day activities, but we heard that hundreds of children and their parents showed up at Ann Morrison Park in hopes of obtaining a tethered balloon ride. Their dreams were answered. At least 22 pilots participated in the perennially popular event.

We were there for the Media Flight on Thursday morning. We are sure glad we were there. The weather was ideal and the photographic opportunities were numerous. (Just check out the following photo pages to see for yourself.) We took up a VIP passenger, Lauren Benedict, and a new crew person, Amber Hanson. Neither had flown before. Their excitement was so high that Knight-N-Gale practically floated without the assistance of any propane.

Tim came down for a splash 'n' dash in Quinn's Pond. In truth, it is more like a medium sized lake than a pond. Lots of pilots came in for a dip in the water. Other nearby lakes also called to the pilots.

Tim landed at Veteran's Memorial Park along side Randy Hart. We were there to help Zack Clark land in the wooded area. I love that balloonists help each other out without even needing to be asked. That is one of the joys of our sport.

Friday the weather was not ideal for free flight, so everyone just put their balloons up and talked to the spectators — *Photo by Patti McCarter*. there are lots and lots of

people who come to this event every year. Getting a chance to answer questions and meet the public is always fun.

After our static display the winds started to pick up as the day progressed. No one thought the Night Glow would work. It was just too windy! We had not been asked to glow this year for the first time in 20 years! Did we stay back in the motel? Nope. Of course not. We joined the chase vehicle procession and snuck into the park.

We still were not sure the glow would happen, but leave it to Boise, the winds calmed down in time for

> the Happy Dance. The Coke and CapEd balloons inflated and kids plus their parents were invited out onto the field to dance under the balloons. As always there were a lot of enthusiastic participants young and old. By the time the sun set the winds were

gone. 16 balloons had an easy glow. There were an estimated 32,000 people in attendance.

We had planned to skip out of the glow early to avoid the traffic jam. Instead we helped Fred and Christel Dinkler pack up. By the time we were done the spectators had just gone "poof." We were able to drive off the field easily. We were able to drive out of

the park with even greater ease. The organizers this year did not let anyone park on the north side of the park, which meant no traffic jam. There was a cop stopping traffic from one small parking lot. so we were able to drive right up to Americana Blvd without touching the brakes once. It was a vast improvement over years past.

For that matter, the new host hotel, the Fairfield Marriot, on Emerald Street, was a very easy commute to the park. Emerald Street turns into Americana so we were able to drive right up to the park entrance without making one turn! On top of that the hotel staff were very kind and efficient. The rooms were really nice, too. I hope this hotel stays as the official hotel from here on out.

Saturday morning looked a little iffy. Some pilots chose not to fly, but a lot did give it a go. Some of the pilots found a box wind and landed back in the park after a short flight. The box finally broke up, so other pilots landed here and there throughout town. Tim, alongside Randy Hart again, landed in the parking lot of the Red Lion Hotel.


