## WAS President's Letter



I'm happy to report that summer has finally arrived in Oregon, just in time for the Tigard Festival of Balloons. What a great weekend of

flying we had. This pilot flew all three days and participated in the nightglows both Friday and Saturday evening. I'm told that record crowds were on hand. Winds were light and variable on Friday, and we almost boxed back to the field. Saturday and Sunday winds were out of the north with some steerage down low. We managed to land at Tualatin High School on Saturday and Sunday, and were able to tether on Sunday to the delight of many local residents that came out to watch. We ended up giving rides to over 25 people - kids of all ages. Some folks had watched the balloons fly over their homes on Saturday and thought they would never have the chance to get up close and personal. I would encourage you to tether after your flight whenever possible, not only for the personal satisfaction that comes with brightening one's day, but the positive PR this brings to ballooning.

During the pilot briefing on Thursday evening, I provided land-owner cards so that we can continue to update red/green zones. Having landed in a park and the high school this weekend, the cards were not needed for my flights, but I know that others did land in private property. I'm hopeful that I'll be getting back these cards in the mail from the landowners as it's important for us to know where we're not welcome

or where we are. For those of you that did not pick up a supply this past weekend, the landowner card can be downloaded from the WAS website. If it's easier, email me and I'll stick a bunch in the mail for you.

As you'll read about later in the newsletter, we have had an accident close to home. Now that our flying season is here, remember to pay extra attention to working with new crew, doubling checking items on your checklist, and reinforcing safety. My crew chief asked that we do a debrief after each flight, and this proved to be very useful for our crew as well as for me. Folks were willing to share what worked for them, what the needed more of and has provided our team with a venue to provide real time feedback to one another.

I want to thank Beth Miller for presenting at our meeting in June, and for Cory for this technical assistance for making it possible. Personally, I learned a few things about insurance and appreciated the questions asked of Beth as I had many of the same questions. It is great to see various elements of ballooning come together to keep our sport healthy. As Beth mentioned in her closing, the sport of ballooning is in our hands.

In July, your Executive Board will be meeting to discuss club business, including the results of the WAS mid-year survey. Thank you for responding to our survey. Look for the results next month, as well as perhaps some changes in response to your feedback. If you would like to add an agenda item, please let me know.

## **Bad Things Can Happen to Good People**

Ballooning is an amazing sport. We get up early, tromp around in the dark, tote and lift all that fabric and meet some of the most wonderful and positive people in the world. One of those people is Eldon Foster. You may not know him by name, but you'll remember him for his great smile and big handle bar mustache. You'd most likely have met him in the company of Bill Woodhead and the WWJD balloon or the Arky balloon.

Friday, June 18, 2010 Eldon was once again crewing for Bill. The flight was over. Bill had landed the balloon at a school in Grants Pass, and was in the process of going through the unloading safety briefing when two of the passengers unexpectedly got out of the balloon. Eldon was holding on to the side of the balloon when that happened.

He suddenly found his feet off the ground.

Eldon tried to hang on; unfortunately he was not able to do it. He fell about 20 feet to the hard pavement below. Eldon was seriously injured. There was a local EMT/ Fire Station just a short distance away. One of the other crewmembers

sprinted to the station. She got there before the 9-1-1 operator could get the call in.

Eldon ended up with a shattered femur, serious knee injury, broken nose, fractured chin, cheekbones and eye orbits as well as a shattered forehead. He, also, has a couple of skull fractures. He was transported by Life Flight to the Rogue Valley Medical Center in Medford. Currently he is in the Critical Care Unit at the hospital. He is healing slowly but surely.

## **Unloading Passengers**

CHIEF CORDON SCHWONTOSKI Seriously? It sounds simple enough, but when and how passengers exit the basket directly impacts their safety and that of others. In ideal weather, your pilot may need crew assistance to help unload passengers. In moderate conditions, your pilot may depend on crew for this aspect of passenger management. And in an emergency, that responsibility may fall entirely into crew hands. The most basic oversights here can mean the difference between safety and anything less.

- 1. Once passengers board, keep them onboard. Announce a last call for bathrooms prior to inflation. Crew members can retrieve forgotten cameras, handle unneeded clothing, or lock vehicles. Illness and emergencies head a very short list of acceptable reasons to disembark, and then only supervised.
- 2. Determine if your first landing site is your final one. Ask your pilot if walking the balloon elsewhere is necessary. If your pilot chooses 1 or 2 passengers to help with this, others may try to follow. Keep everyone else onboard for needed weight.
- 3. Monitor passengers very closely. Watch for anyone looking for a footstep or way to exit on their own. Expect passengers to forget any briefing instructions about staying in the basket until told otherwise. Some believe they can get out any time prior to launch or after landing. Many others will start to get out right on landing, thinking the ride's over and it's safe to. Your pilot's very busy at launch and landing and may not notice.
- 4. When near the basket, physically block passengers from getting out by stretching your arms between 2 burner supports (flexi or rigid poles) on a side with steps. Doing this casually but im-

- mediately upon landing is enough to discourage nearly anyone from hopping out or knowing your true motive.
- 5. Assess passengers' status before allowing anyone out. More passengers suffer injuries on landing than at any other time. Especially on hard, dragging, or basket-tipping landings, ask if everyone's OK before helping anyone out of the basket. A twisted ankle, banged knee, or arm/wrist injury may require medical attention before they move further. When passengers get thrown into each other, ask if everyone's OK, be ready to assist those on top of others off and out, and offer whatever assistance is needed.
- 6. Before anyone leaves, your pilot will vent some air to reduce lift. Ensure your pilot or crew chief has the red line in hand or the balloon is sufficiently deflated to prevent dragging forward or re-launching. You'll know when: the basket won't feel "light," throat fabric will wrinkle or narrow, and the envelope/basket may lean downwind. As the basket hops and drops suddenly as air is vented, watch your feet and make sure no one leaves the ground.
- 7. "Spot" all exiting passengers with 1 or 2 crew members; even the most able can trip and fall

Every aspect of unloading passengers revolves around its Golden Rule: only your pilot decides who leaves the basket and when. Here's why. Your pilot depends on passenger weight to handle and stabilize the balloon. This is the "Wizard of Oz" effect; when Dorothy and Toto bailed out, off went the wizard in an unexpected and uncontrolled climb. If a 200-pound passenger exits the basket unannounced on landing, most sport balloons will immediately respond with a 200-400 foot-per-minute climb (depending on many factors) and take along anyone partially or still onboard. It will catch your pilot off guard. The fuel system may be partially or completely shut down. Other passengers (or your pilot) may be in the process of exiting the basket. Crew may be holding onto the basket or crown line. Downwind obstacles may not allow a safe relaunch. Wind, light, and fuel may not be sufficient to reach another suitable landing site – if there is one. There are generally only 2 good reasons to ever leave the basket: the ride's over and your pilot said so, or the basket's on fire. No good can come from early exits for most other reasons.

Aside from this, other unloading strategies apply any time you have passengers in your basket: before launch, passenger switches during a "hop," final landings, tethers, and even basket displays at events or school presentations. Start with these suggestions and add your own:

while climbing over the basket rail. Be ready for a "catch" as even a healthy able-bodied adult can falter. Unloading elderly, physically challenged, or other passengers may require crew assistance. Some may need a small step stool, help lifting a leg, or even to be lifted. Watch all legs and ankles until they're firmly and safely on the ground.

- 8. Watch everyone's head on burner frames, blast valves, and control lines or tie-off harnesses as they climb out. What they don't see overhead as they focus on their next step can cause quite a headache for them and burned fabric for you. A quick word of warning is usually more than enough here. Shield blast valves with your hand when necessary to prevent unwanted blasts.
- 9. Tailor your assistance to the basket position: upright, leaning, or horizontal. How fast and which direction passengers exit may depend on wind speed, site terrain, and other factors. Many pilots unload passengers upwind to prevent the basket from laying onto or running forward over them. Use extreme caution when unloading passengers downwind, especially in moderate/strong winds or from a leaning basket.
- 10. Make sure everyone's fine first if the basket is horizontal or faces downhill. Passengers may need to crawl through the uprights to exit the basket; be sure the fuel system is shut down to prevent surprises when someone kicks, bumps, or steps into a blast valve. Watch that no one becomes entangled or trips in vent lines.
- 11. Keep all passengers upwind, to the side or, or at a safe distance from

the basket so that basket and fabric layover can proceed. If you need passengers to add weight as the basket tips, brief everyone (onboard or outside) where to hold on and what to do.

12. Tethers present multiple loading/ unloading sequences and windows for mishap. Predetermine with your pilot how to select passengers for each hop: total number, total weight, etc. Always add one or more passengers before allowing one out; the ratio will vary each time. Shuffle passengers within the basket to make room as new one enter and crowd them. Point or lead exiting passengers outside the tether area to avoid line and landing hazards once they're safely on their feet outside the basket.

A surprise exit during a tether can prove especially disastrous. After your balloon (and pilot and passengers) suddenly climbs at 200-400 feet per minute (and probably can't level out before maximum tether height), it'll come to an equally abrupt stop as tether lines go tight. Balloon components may break from the jolt. Lines may loosen or release and damage anchor points on the ground or those nearby. Those onboard may be bounced around or even out. With stakes like these, passenger management during a tether demands crew attention and participation.

Many crew consider unloading passengers a do-it-yourself project or no-brainer for pilots alone, yet it's another aspect of flight safety that needs constant attention. There's nothing worse (except power line strikes and proposal flights where she says NO!) than a passenger surviving the flight and a harrowing landing only to be injured getting out of the basket. Take every precaution necessary to make the last step of your passenger's flight a safe one.

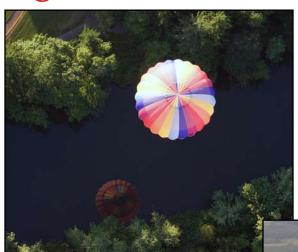






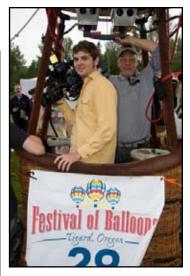

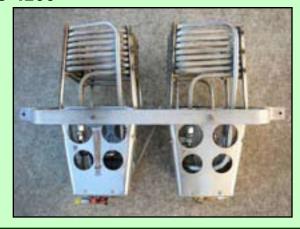
